Context

- Since 2008, VAC has covered the costs of marijuana for medical purposes for eligible Veterans (with physician or health care practitioner authorization).
- 2014, Health Canada amended regulations lessening certain controls on access (in the earlier days only a specialist could approve).
- In his spring 2016 report on VAC's Drug Benefits, the Auditor General recommended that we explore ways in which the costs associated with marijuana for medical purposes can be contained.
- Veteran recipient and expenditure numbers have risen dramatically.
- The high daily dosage amounts have raised concern about the health, safety and well-being of our Veterans (immediate and long-term health effects).






What are the numbers telling us?

Facts for 2015-2016: Of the 1,762 Veteran recipients:

Grams Reimbursed (per Veteran/per day) 1g-2g: 250 3g-4g: 331 5g-6g: 477 7g-8g: 169 9g-10g: 536 10+g: 7



Disability Benefit Conditions*

Musculoskeletal: 2,852

PTSD: 1,204

Other Mental Health: 495

Pain: 430

Work Underway

- Concern for the well-being of Veterans compels action
- March 2016 began an Internal Review to contribute to an informed and evidence-based policy
- Internal Review comprises a three-phased approach





Phase 1 – Internal Review

1. Internal Management Review

- Analysis of statistical data regarding marijuana for medical purposes is underway.
- Comprehensive Literature Review is underway.
 - Legislative and Regulatory Framework
- Comparison to foreign countries is underway.
- Client profile is complete.





Phase 2 - Consultation

2. Consultation with Veterans and Stakeholders and other interested parties

- Discussions with Licensed Producers April 15th to 19th
- Discussion with Medical Expert Panel April 18th
- Discussion with Veteran Stakeholders today's Veteran's Summit May 9th
- Discussions with Beneficiaries May 11th





Phase 3 – Decision and Policy

- Phases 1 and 2 will inform the Policy Phase
- Health Canada and the Department of Justice will be consulted at key points through VAC's Review.
- Interim policy development continues and will be informed as additional information becomes available.
- End result an informed evidence-based decision.
- Policy development continues and results will be communicated.
